Editorial

As we enter the last quarter of the year, Choir Music continues to enjoy a renaissance both in terms of its performance and in the quality of choral music being written. The likes of composers John Rutter, Paul Mealor, Patrick Hawes, Eric Whitacre, Jonathon Dove, James Whitbourn, Bob Chilcott, Will Todd, Gabriel Jackson, Cecilia McDowall and Deborah Mason (to name a few) continue to provide both modern, challenging and beautiful choral works. In addition new choirs continue to be formed across a range of singing styles, and more importantly flourish, both on the amateur and professional scene. Television and Radio continue to do their bit to encourage an interest in singing be it Gareth Malone's various series, Glee or choral involvement on Britain's got Talent. The success of Gareth's latest series "Sing while you Work" will be measured in two very different ways. The first is the popularity of the series. Bearing in mind the end result is a highly edited version of events, with the onus on the 'back story' or 'the journey' that may be fairly transient. What is more important is the legacy of the series as epitomised by the success of the Military Wives Choir, whose network continues to flourish.

To help with the legacy of "The Choir: Sing While You Work", BBC Learning has produced a website providing information on how to set up a choir at work, listing the benefits to both staff and employers and providing downloadable resources such as posters and a singing guide to help anyone who's interested in singing at work. The website <u>www.bbc.co.uk/thechoir</u> went live on 18th September in time for the launch of the BBC 2 Series on 20th September 2012. The website rightly highlights the work of 'Music in Offices', the UK's leading provider of workplace choirs and instrumental tuition programmes. Founded in 2006, by Tessa Marchington, they currently run 22 choirs and also the prestigious Office Choir of the Year competition, presented in partnership with Classic FM. British Choirs on the Net and this newsletter have, over the last few years, advertised a number of Choral Composition Competitions. An unfortunate trend is that they generally practice 'positive discrimination' - that is they are only open to a certain age group. The latest example comes from the Incorporated Society of Musicians who's 2013 Composition Competition is restricted to composers aged from 23—35. It does make it clear in its paperwork that this competition is aimed at inspiring a new generation of composers but it does also send out a message to other choral composers outside this age range that their work may be considered less inspired and of lesser value. While there is a need to refresh the choral gene pool we also need to ensure that opportunities continue to exist to enable older composers, whether established or novices, to have access to open competition and I hope the ISM will lead on that. At the end of the day talent and art should out.

Another worrying occurrence, which I hope will not become a trend, is the request from some choirs to ask potential new members to provide not just a musical CV but also a photo!. While the general appearance of a choir can add to the performance, this smacks of pandering to the tele-visual and could leave any unsuccessful auditionee wondering on what basis they may have been rejected. One of the great strengths of choir singing is that it is open to all regardless of age, religious persuasion, ethnic background, sexual or political preference, disability and appearance. (For choirs whose main aim is to have fun even singing ability is discretionary).

Finally as we enter 'Messiah' season may I wish you all a wonderfully musical and emotionally satisfying end to the year, and where it matters, a financially successful season.

British Choirs on the Net Mailing Services British Choirs on the Net holds a database of over 2000 choir email contacts as a result of its business with these choirs. While the site has no intention of selling this it can provide a mailing service to choirs and businesses to help promote events and services of interest to the choral community. Recent mailings have been sent out on behalf of the The Sixteen, Cork International Choral Festival and Disneyland Paris. It is accepted that not everything that is mailed out is of interest to every choir, the mailing is for the choir members as a whole rather than just the email recipient. You can of course unsubscribe form the mailing list if you wish, I would just point out that it is an all or nothing option.

Concertfinder & British Choirs on the Net Concertfinder is a free online concert diary. It is part of British Choirs on the Net under www.choirs.org.uk and also a standalone website under www.concertfinder.co.uk.

Each concert is listed with the same prominence and for this reason I do not include the orchestra, conductors or soloists details. Additionally non choral works are omitted from the listing even when they form part of the concert programme.

Please submit your concert details via email in text format. Please do not send pdf or html posters which require the salient points to be extracted and can delay posting the concert. Also do not forget to let me know the date of the concert as well as the who, where, what and ticket information. <u>www.concertfinder.co.uk</u>

Choirsites They say every picture tells a story and the same rule applies with choirs. The choir that has a website where potential members can see pictures of the choir, their future concerts and repertoire is likely to prove more attractive than simply a listed choir with a text description and an e-mail contact. VocalBroker This is a site which lists vocal soloists seeking work with Choral Societies and Choruses on the Oratorio or concert platform. It is not an agency and the Societies negotiate directly with singers with Vocalbroker taking no commission. They are all experienced singers and choral societies, and choruses

Summer 2012 saw a flurry of choirs head off on their eagerly anticipated Choir Tours to an array of destinations throughout Europe with the help of specialist Choir Tour organisers, Rayburn Tours. Hallé Youth Choir decided that Belgium was the destination for them and with Rebecca Rowe, a Rayburn Tours Courier, by their side they set off. Here she gives us an insight into just some of her personal highlights...

Thursday 2nd August

The saying goes, 'start as you mean to go on', and I am pleased to say that a smooth journey over the channel, arriving in Belgium ahead of schedule and being greeted by a warm and friendly welcome from the hostel staff were both accurate signs of things to come! The first afternoon in Antwerp was spent exploring the main shopping street of *Meir* which hosted a wide selection of shops, including *The Chocolate Line*, a beautiful chocolate shop inside the Paleis op de Meir.

Friday 3rd August:

Today the choir performed at Brussels Cathedral - a truly spectacular venue! The choir stood on raised staging in front of the altar and performed to an appreciative and warm audience. I introduced the group in French and programmes were handed out at the venue. After the concert we were treated to a fantastic chocolate-making demonstration at *Planète Chocolate* where some of the group were able to join in making chocolate and pralines – a true Belgian experience!

Saturday 4th August:

After a morning in the picturesque city of Ghent, we headed to Mechelen for the group's second concert of the tour. We had scheduled a rehearsal at 5.00pm at St. Rumbold's Cathedral for the organist and then at 5.30pm for the choir. We met Bram who was incredibly helpful in organising the choir and helping to decide on the best position for them to be – in the end they performed from the gallery. Bram set up a camera and projector so the audience had the best possible view. The acoustics were incredible and the group really enjoyed performing here to an audience of over 100 people.

Sunday 5th August:

Bruges – a beautiful city brimming with history and culture around every corner! The choir performed on the steps in front of the altar at St. Salvator's Cathedral. A venue such as this can't fail to attract an audience that flocks in to listen to visiting choirs sing – and we weren't disappointed.

Monday 6th August:

Unfortunately our time in Belgium had come to an end. A superb Choir Tour all-round!
